President's Corner

A Glimpse of the Future

Each spring, your Board of Stewards has gathered off-site to devote uninterrupted time for focus on the Fellowship's bigger picture. We have typically assessed progress, developed our vision, and set goals. This year the Board met on May 6-8 at Southern Shores, NC, in the lovely vacation home of a member.

We had two main mandates this year. First, it was time to review and update our 2007 Five-Year Plan. Secondly, but not separately, we addressed the assignments from the 2011 Vision and Planning effort that culminated in November with the Common Ground Workshop – the day-long congregational workshop sponsored by the Vision and Planning Committee.

At the retreat we began our work with a provocative session of SWOT – that's an exercise of asking each participant to focus on the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats to the health of our Fellowship. Then we launched ourselves on a time-machine to imagine our Fellowship as it could be in ten years – 2022. What would we be, what could we be, in ten years and what steps should we consider taking now to get there? We foresee a rich and exciting future.

Using the congregational input at the 2011 Common Ground Workshop, we considered all of the members' suggestions, and we focused our work on the biggest questions:

- Religious Education (UU for Kids and Adults). How do we build programs to attract the younger families that are the future of UUFR-VA? How do we accommodate kids' programs, given the lack of space?
- Community Service Niche. How do we find our special community service/social justice niche in the community – an effort where we can leverage other community resources to make a real difference?
- Building Expansion. When should we be considering expansion of our facilities to

- provide programs for kids and others? And at what point do we need to expand our sanctuary to accommodate our increasing membership and attendance?
- Paid Staff. At what point do we require a part-time minister to serve our Fellowship and represent us in the community? At what point would we need some part-time administrative assistance to help with the myriad details of operating a healthy organization? Rev. Kathy Duhon gave us some valuable insights into how we could benefit from a trained minister.

Want to know more? Mark your calendar. On June 17, at the Third Sunday Potluck Luncheon after the service, Marge Rowden will present the Board's initial report on the retreat and provide the opportunity for you to ask the Board your questions.

hour a week. Using the format already set up, you would prepare the Order of Service and the Announcements section of the bulletin. The Music Coordinator sends you the music information well in advance.



Circle of Life

Cliff Schelling will facilitate a Circle of Life session entitled: "The Second Half of Life," on Tuesday, June 6th, at 7:00 P.M. in our UU home.

"Sometimes children lose touch with their needs altogether and spend a life of chameleon-like adaptation to the demands of those around them. Thus, so many of us live as strangers to ourselves. The message of one's essential powerlessness is overlearned and one feels little permission to express oneself forthrightly. Here again, permission will not be given; the adult must seize it. What once passed for amiability, for a cooperative spirit, for 'niceness,' becomes, in the second half of life, an unacceptable liability. This accommodating reflex, so necessary an adaptation for the child, requires the daily sacrifice of integrity as an adult - then it is not so 'nice.' When we come to recognize that we are a truth, a truth meant to be lived, a truth the denial of which harms not only ourselves, but others as well, then we are much more inclined to speak directly and candidly."


