Who's Who in UU: Shirley Kinney

Imagine That! creator and gift to the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, Shirley Kinney, started life as a twin, always having a best friend. As a young adult, she was a teacher of 5th & 6th graders, and took very seriously the notion that children should enjoy school. She wanted them to wonder *why?* And, judging by what she has done for this congregation with her creativity and talents, we know she was quite good with those kids. However, after six years, she decided that was enough (we can only guess why ...) An ad in the paper for the Birmingham, Michigan Art Association, offering beginning drawing classes started a true love for Shirley, tapping into her enormous creative potential. She had loved drawing figures, and began taking pottery classes. She didn't think she was too good at it, but it *felt* good. Her sister thought Shirley should make dolls for every member of the family for Christmas one year, and provided her twin with fabric ... she moved closer toward her calling: *creativity*. She loved fabric and the colors but did not like using a pattern; the cloth dolls were not alive! Shirley moved on to clay, which allowed for lots of facial expression. Her whimsical creations are priceless, funny, charming and unique, as though each one could almost talk

or walk or dance or sing. She would ultimately like to see robotic clay figures – not too far-fetched, as Tom's brother-in-law is a robotic engineer. Watch out! Perhaps she will begin with puppets on a string ...

Science Fiction is a great love of Shirley's, where anything is possible. What if ... current Science Fiction is not satisfying as it is full of end of time, not future promise. She has memorized the final sentence from the last Star Trek series: "The goal of the Starship Enterprise should not be to go where no one has gone before ... rather it should be to explore the limitless possibilities of existence."

This idea of endless possibilities is expressed in her unique ability to invite women into her home for an opportunity to create in a space where there is no fault, and everyone is creative. Thus, Imagine That! Using cigar boxes, pieces of tin, feathers, seed pods ... Shirley's workshop is a cornucopia of interesting things, a feast for the eyes and imagination. This began about six years ago with Linda Weber, Audrey Brainard and Fran Schelling — they wanted the UUFR-VA to complete a tree for the annual Festival of the Trees at the YMCA. That was the year of the seed pods and gourds, and everyone loved doing it. The goal evolved into exploring new ideas and materials, and watching people change and own their creative aspect. With a donation of \$150 — seed money for materials — the transformation began. Sales have been in the foyer of the UUFR-VA, at the Northumberland Studio Tour, and at the Irvington Farmers Market. Shirley takes her own creations to the UU art gallery in Richmond.

Shirley and husband, Tom, have been together since age thirteen. They were in the same Civics class. Tom began walking her home every day. They were married, and soon after began making plans to retire at age 45. Tom was an engineer with General Motors. Together Tom and Shirley designed and built houses to get to the big dream.

Shirley later went back to school to become a paralegal, which led to a position as administrator for a law school – an intense, stressful environment where her challenge was to make things go smoothly. She met the challenge, and loved doing it. She worked in that position for five years – and then it was time to move on to the **Big Dream**. That was 1990. They came to Ottoman and lived on their boat for a year, designing the house that is Coventry. They worked and planned and picked out what they could afford and, with Tom working in DC, Shirley worked at Yankee Point Marina and taught GED classes to get the money they needed to complete and furnish their dream home. It was a do-it ourselves project. An ad in the local paper brought them to the Unitarian Fellowship – the second meeting at the White Stone Women`s Club.

Shirley remembers Frank Elliott playing the guitar and leading the singing, and someone was needed to play the piano so he would only have to sing. Shirley was terrified to play publicly, but UUFR-VA seemed a safe and forgiving environment to try. (She *knows* there is someone at the UUFR-VA who can play the piano but is too unsure to step up. Well, now is your chance!)

The beauty of the UUFR-VA: the place lets you be you. Indeed. Need we note the many contributions Shirley has made to our environment? Do we have the space to note her contributions? Don`t ask her, she will never tell. But, you are welcome to step up and join her in any number of activities. Shirley is truly someone special, and a lot of fun!

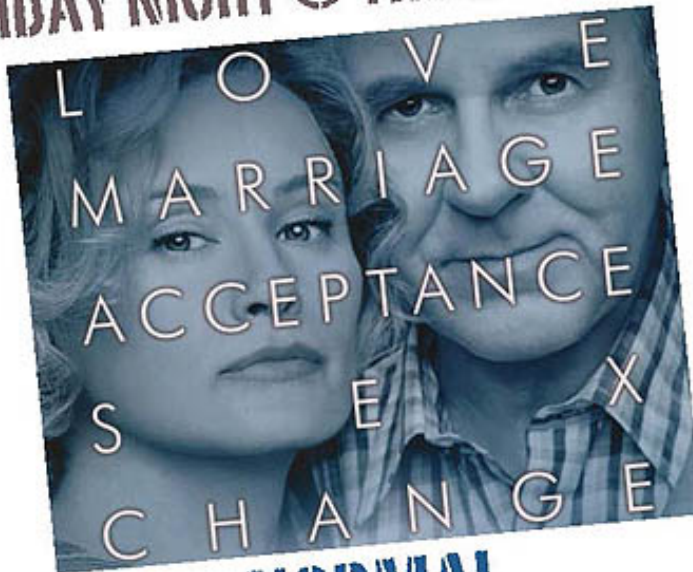
