Being There

I've taken many pictures of interesting, sometimes ominous-looking, clouds this summer only to find that when I later look at these pictures they just don't capture the experience of seeing these events in person.

Experiencing life's events can be the same. Talking to people in person can be a fun, intense, frustrating, and a rewarding experience. "Talking" to people on social media or via email can be all of those things but usually doesn't invoke the same intense feelings as a face-to-face encounter. Many people are now participating in several forms of social media like Facebook and Twitter. Here, we can be exposed to any number of news events, personal status reports, and political opinions, and all sorts of animal videos. All of this stimuli can get us so caught up in what we're reading or seeing, that we just simply react to this information without much thought. That's where the trouble can start, especially if what you've just read causes

you to react in a negative way. It's so easy to type out an impulsive response that we can easily respond in a way that within 10 seconds of hitting the return key, we wish we hadn't responded at all to that particular Facebook or Twitter post.

I recently read a book titled "Don't bite the hook: Finding Freedom from Anger, Resentment and other Destructive Forces" by Pema Chodron. The book explores ways to not be a victim of your emotions but rather to take personal control of your emotions. The premise is that we are daily buffeted by events that can cause us to react in negative ways if we allow ourselves to simply become a victim of our impulses.

One of the big problems with social media is that you are unable to fully express your thoughts through written word alone. We are told that about 80% of our communications with another person are non-verbal. So, it is very difficult for us to discuss complicated ideas via email or social media because we can't project 80% of our communications with the other person or people. This leads to a lot of misinterpretations of the ideas we're trying to express. This in turn can cause us to respond in a way that can cause us to regret our impulsive response. In other words we all too often "bite the hook".

Fortunately for us, every Sunday we have a chance to engage in personal conversations with members of our fellowship but not enough time to have real in depth conversations.

This is a roundabout way to encourage everyone to attend **The Annual Fellowship Picnic on September 21**st so you can "Be There" and engage in some rare one-on-one 100% communications with other members, and friends, of our fellowship! UU for Kids Focus

Share your Talents, Skills, Humor and/or Wisdom with the UU Kids!

The "How are the Children?" Task Force has been considering how we might make it possible for families with children to easily participate in the fellowship more than just one Sunday a month. We are proposing that the fellowship plan activities for the UU Kids two times each month – continuing to provide a formal program on the first Sunday of the month that utilizes UUA materials designed for encouraging exploration of the UU principles, and adding a more informal program on the third Sunday of the month.

Please consider signing up for one of the third Sunday sessions. Our vision is for a variety of fellowship members to engage with the kids – planning an arts and crafts activity, teaching a skill, sharing some stories, taking the Kids on a walk or playing a game. Our UU Kids range in age from three to thirteen – so you would be signing up to spend about 45 minutes with a small group of about two to five Kids. Some of the ideas people have floated: building a birdhouse that can be hung in the

trees, painting a picture that can be hung in the foyer, singing songs and/or playing musical instruments, teaching skills like knot tying or how to safely build a camp fire, laughter yoga, acting exercises, making leaf prints, baking cookies, making a holiday craft ... or anything you *love* to do! Teams of two or three are also welcome to sign up and have some fun together with the UU Kids.

There are two easy ways to sign up: email Kristi, or sign up on the sheet that will be available in the foyer from September 7th until all of the dates are full. The dates are: September 21st, October 19th, November 16th, December 21st, January 18th, February 15th, March 15th, April 19th, and May 17th.

Raffling for Education

The Lancaster County Virginia Education Foundation is a local charity that raises funds specifically for the public schools. For next year's proposed programs, a total of \$35,000 must be raised. *Broadway in Richmond* has been successful in the past, and is offered again this year. There are five individual raffles, with tickets only \$10 each, or three for \$20. The winner of each raffle receives four matinee Orchestra tickets *plus* \$100 in cash. The shows are at the Altria Theater in Richmond, Saturday matinee. The shows are: The Book

of Mormon, Nov. 8, 2014; and in 2015: Million Dollar Quartet, Jan. 17th; Sister Act, Feb. 14th; Chicago the Musical, March 14th; and Memphis, April 25th. All proceeds benefit programs in Lancaster County Public Schools.

The LCVEF provides:

- All third grade students take a trip to D.C. in the spring, expenses paid
- Celebration of Excellence dinner for Scholars at Lancaster High School
- Mini-grants for teachers, up to \$500
- Lancaster High School science and math lab equipment including incubators, centrifuges and lap tops fully loaded with software
- Balanced Literacy Program for 4th, 5th and 6th grades to bring students up to reading standards by the end of the 6th grade
- For the first time this year, a Coordinator for Volunteers and Mentors

As UUFR-VA works on the Kids First program, let's not forget the existing programs for other students.


The three options fit into the categories of:

Kids First Foundation

Most important: UUFR-VA's Kids First high-quality Early Preschool for three year old at-risk children starts September 2nd at Lancaster Primary School. Lisa Hudnall, certified Early Childhood Education lead teacher, is applying her 30 years of experience to change those young lives for the better. And you had a part in making that happen.

So, let's get caught up on some organizational details. Kids First Foundation (KFF) received IRS 501(c)(3) tax exempt status in the record time of four weeks vs the usual 4-6 months. We were among the first to use the IRS's new system labeled Form 1023-EZ. No one here, or in Richmond, knew what to expect. Now, they all know due to KFF's success.

In case you missed the Sunday, June 1st presentation, that gained Niche program approval, the Foundation is UUFR-VA's Kids First Program financial center – the "bank" for Kids First Program. Its Directors coordinate fund raising, manage and invest those funds, and distribute grants in response to proposals to fund the early preschool and hunger/nutrition Kids First Programs. The Foundation Directors currently are MJ Anderson, Judi Caples, Dave Dustin, Tom Kinney, Mike Knez, Lynn Langley, and Bob Weekley. Having the Foundation allows us to add directors who enhance our skills, but are not UUFR-VA affiliated. KFF Director Bill Warren is contributing his exceptional

community fundraising skills and Dr. Holly Wargo, former Principal of Lancaster Primary School when the first Early Preschool class was organized, is now Northumberland's Assistant Superintendent – pursuing her strong interest in helping at-risk kids there.

Kids First Program, part of UUFR-VA's Faith In Action Committee, welcomes a diversity of donors who recognize UUFR-VA as the "go to" organization for breaking the cycle of generational poverty. But some are shy about donating to religious organizations. KFF is an opportunity to support without theological misgivings. Program donations exceed \$55,000 from organizations, individuals, and churches with no religious ties to UUFR-VA.
